Seahaven Responders are a team of volunteers living in the local community who work alongside South East Coast Ambulance Service (SECAmb) responding to emergency 999 calls. Team members respond in their spare time or whilst at work and are despatched by the SECAmb control centre at the same time as an ambulance; living locally they can provide a much quicker response in an emergency situation. Each year the team volunteers in excess of 2000 hours and responds to over 600 emergencies. Team members use their own vehicles to respond to all calls.

Resuscitation Council data shows that each year in the United Kingdom there are approximately 60,000 cases of suspected cardiac arrest; currently less than one in ten of these patients makes a full recovery. The early initiation of Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) can increase the chances of survival significantly and defibrillation within 3 to 5 minutes of collapse can produce survival rates of over 50%. Each minute of delay to defibrillation reduces the probability of survival by 10%.

All responders are thoroughly trained and undertake regular assessment to ensure their competence is maintained. Each responder is issued with a comprehensive medical kit including a defibrillator allowing them to undertake potentially life-saving treatment often before an ambulance arrives.

Even though SECAmb provide training and support to all responders the funds for equipment, uniform and the team vehicle (a 4x4 vehicle used to transport personnel and equipment) all have to be raised through local fundraising events and initiatives. It costs approximately £3000 to fully equip each team member; this includes a defibrillator, kit bag, medical observation equipment, vehicle signs and uniform.

Automatic External
Defibrillators (AED) can be
used by anybody without any
specialist training; as soon
as the defibrillator is turned
on it will provide instructions
to the user and guide them
through the whole process.

There are a number of Public Access Defibrillators located throughout Newhaven and the location of these defibrillators can be found on the responders website seahavenresponders.org Seahaven Responders can also offer training in CPR and the use of AEDs to community groups.

Would you like to become a community first responder?

You must be able to volunteer for a minimum of 20 hours each month, attend monthly training sessions, have your own vehicle, pass a DBS check and be willing to attend a 5-day training course. Additionally you will be expected to support the team in undertaking public education and fundraising events. Lewes District Council's first Leader from Newhaven!

The club hopes everyone in the community is well in these strange times. It's been a busy summer for the football club as we prepare for the season ahead. Improvements have been made to the Trafalgar Ground at Fort Road, there is a new stand opposite the main stand, new toilet facilities, and the car park has been cleared and is now usable (meaning less traffic on Court Farm Road). Our youth section has its own changing rooms and

a youth cafe has now been opened in the old clubhouse, open on match days for tea/coffee and food.

The club now has 21 teams affiliated; 5 senior teams and 16 youth teams covering football for men, women, boys and girls, something we are very proud of. The men's first team play on Saturdays at 3pm, the ladies first team on Sundays at 2pm, the men's under 23 team on Mondays



ACCELERATING REGENERATION IN NEWHAVEN


Newhaven is in line for exciting new developments, after Lewes District Council successfully bid for new Government funding.

As part of the Towns Fund initiative which includes representatives from Newhaven Town Council, Maria Caulfield MP, Lewes District Council, East Sussex County Council and a wide range of business and community groups, Newhaven has been awarded £500k to develop a new café, cycle hub

and information point on land at Railway Quay, adjacent to the former UTC building. LDC is currently awaiting receipt of the funding, but is working to prepare a planning application and anticipates project completion for Easter 2021. It is intended that the scheme will be a 'meanwhile use' for up to five years, with the success of measures being reviewed regularly to ensure that the facilities serve the community - as well as visitors effectively.

Lewes District Council has also secured funding from the Government's Getting Building Fund to bring the former UTC back into active use. Works will commence next year to convert the building to offer a range of training, commercial space and public services to ensure a sustainable future for such an iconic landmark in Newhaven.

More information will be provided on the detailed plans for the former UTC in a future edition of Newhaven Matters.

ST MICHAEL'S 900TH ANNIVERSARY


ST MICHAEL'S, NEWHAVEN

BEAUTIFUL, ILLUSTRATED BOOK



A short film telling the story of one of Newhaven's greatest tragedies will be premiered on YouTube at the end of November.




In January 1800, Britain was at war with France and HMS Brazen was patrolling the coast between the Isle of Wight and Beachy Head. In the early hours of 26th a storm began to rage and the Brazen was forced onto rocks just west of Newhaven. Despite valiant efforts to rescue



the men all but one, a nonswimmer named Jeremiah Hill, were lost. The town's shock at the scale of the tragedy led to money being raised for a lifeboat, some 20 years before the creation of the RNLI.

A memorial to the 105 men lost still stands in the churchyard of St Michael's Church and a service takes place there on the last Sunday of every January.

The film is funded by an Arts Council National Lottery Project Grant and is based around a piece of music and narration written by Mike Flood especially for the church's 900th anniversary this year. It will tell the story from the perspective of the captain's young wife, Louisa Hanson, and reimagines the events of that fateful night through a combination of live action and shadow puppetry. The role of Louisa is being played by local actress, Lucy Alexander, who reprises her role for the film, and the

GROWING OUR OWN

Newhaven Tree Wardens have been growing our own trees from seed, and now's the time to collect nuts, berries, pips and seeds to try and hatch a tree seedling. The rules are simple, put your seed or nut etc into a pot of soil, keep it moist and outside if possible (on a windowsill if not) and wait till the Spring! Don't forget to chat to them, and be aware not all will hatch, it took

the author 3 years of trying!

The older trees will soon be ready to plant out along with the millennium elms, which are DED (Dutch Elm Disease) resistant, and other saplings being brought on by the team.

Are you interested in learning to row? Newhaven Gig Rowing Club (NGRC) are opening up their waiting list for those that would like to get involved and learn to row efficiently. British Rowing and the Cornish Pilot Gig Association confirmed that all rowing could recommence (with strict safety guidelines in place, of course) at the end of August. Your safety is always the club's priority, and with this in mind they ask that a health questionnaire is completed and returned in advance.

Once this has been passed you can then book onto your maiden voyage where you will be taught the basics by the side of the pontoon, then go off for your first row. This session is approximately 90 minutes. All this for only £5! Each row after this is then just £3.

NEWHAVEN HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Munitions barge explodes under cliffs – Newhaven 22nd November 1944

What is thought to be the biggest explosion in our county during WW2 happened at about 5am on 22nd November 1944. The tug, HMS St. Mellows, was towing a barge carrying many tons of explosives up the Channel when the barge broke free of

the tug in very rough seas. The barge drifted inshore, under the cliffs, to the west of the breakwater hitting a land mine. It was first thought that the explosion was caused by enemy action, possibly that of a v2 rocket.

Almost all properties in Newhaven were damaged and many properties in the surrounding neighbourhood, as far afield as Lewes and Seaford, were also damaged. The explosion was so great that it was felt in Eastbourne and heard many miles further on.

Casualties were surprisingly light considering the size of the explosion; this was mainly due to the time of the incident and the protection afforded to Newhaven by the west beach cliffs. Nevertheless there were hundreds of minor casualties, most injuries caused by flying glass, furniture blown around and ceilings collapsing on sleeping residents. There were some serious injuries and there was one fatality, a naval rating.



Explosion wrecked coast town

The story can now be told of a shattering explosion which blasted Newhaven, Sussex, from end to end in the early hours of November 22 last year. It was caused by an ammunition barge – loaded with 500 tons of explosives – going ashore just outside the breakwater and blowing up.

There was no trace of the crew, but on shore the casualty list was extraordinary light. In the docks one naval rating was killed, with two others missing; in the town 90 civilians were injured; scores had first-aid.

There was scarcely an undamaged house within two miles of the explosion, and property was damaged three miles away at Seaford, and Eastbourne, even farther along the coast. Shop windows were broken in Lewes, eight miles inland.

About 500 people were rendered homeless. Special arrangements had

to be made by the Ministry of Food – practically all the food in the shops was condemned because of the danger of glass splinters. Squads of builders were hurried to Newhaven in motor coaches to cope with first-aid repairs to property.

Except for one coastal branch line, normal rail services were working within a few hours. The real work of the harbour was uninterrupted, and ships were able to leave regularly with supplies for overseas.

lockdown, so much so that we decided to keep going over both Easter and Summer holidays. For some lockdown has been a positive experience, giving time for reflection and family, for others it's been more frightening, or lonely, but staying in touch and writing about it has been a support to

everyone. The group seems closer than ever and we are all looking forward to meeting in person again as soon as everyone is able. Umi Sinha – tutor.

One group member shares her personal experience of the pandemic with us here.

HOW MANY METAPHORS DOES A PANDEMIC MAKE?



I wonder how long it will take us to unlearn all the terminology. Did we really need to have a whole vocabulary for the pandemic while we stayed home, protected the NHS, stayed alert and pulled together, clapped for carers, and thought of others while all these waves and peaks battered our shores.

We might have all been watching the same daily coronavirus briefing, but far from facing the same problem, we are differentiated by age, ethnicity, gender and underlying health conditions. Some of us could work from home, some had priority for food delivery and collection, "key workers" had dedicated shopping times.

During the pandemic we have all been in the same global storm, but - let's be really clear on this point – no one has been in the same boat. Some boats are bigger and more seaworthy than others. I am a fortunate person, but that didn't make me feel better as my little boat began to sink with the weight of all the fear I let in. Before this kicked off, I'd already had my leaky moments in life.

We fill our life with activities and other people, yet now there was all this warning noise about coronavirus and distractions were unavailable. At the time of the complete lockdown I hid with my dog in the bushes to avoid meeting others on my daily walk. I became expert on my potential survival as if I were a life insurance underwriter and those unacceptable parts of me just got right out of the box. I had always hoped to fool everyone with a thoroughly smiley cando attitude, but here I was putting up a no entry sign so delivery drivers wouldn't come close. Rather than talking

to people, I actively avoided them, literally turned my face, or held my breath. I failed to respond to emails, texts and phone messages from friends. Ashamed of my fear while totally paralyzed by it, I pulled up the drawbridge to avoid exposure, and emotional as well as physical risk.

Finally, still here in the middle of the wood, from behind another tree, I'm looking for the much-touted silver lining in this whole experience. It's probably at the end of one of the rainbows I see in all those windows.

HILLCREST CENTRE NEWS

After more than 5 months of being closed, the Hillcrest reopened on 1st September. During lockdown there were two organisations, hosted in the building, that continued to serve the community: the Hillcrest Café, an independent business run by Anita Jones and Diets Verschuren, and CTLA (Community Transport) hosted in the basement.

NEWS FROM THE HILLCREST CAFÉ

While the café was closed, Anita and Diets decided to fill a need and have been providing home-cooked, fresh food to the over-70s three days a week. They spend each morning chopping vegetables and cooking, so the food is as fresh as possible, and by 11.45 they are out in their cars delivering meals, with the help of generous volunteers Jo, Rowena, Sharon, Sarah, Pam, Phyllis, Jimmy and Brian. Delivering meals also allows them to check on people and make sure they are okay. If someone doesn't answer, they check with a neighbour to ensure the person is being looked after. The service

reduced to two days a week, Tuesdays and Fridays, from 1st September.

From 1st September, the café also reopened 'in a small way', with social distancing in place. Food is not on display but stored in the fridge, heated and brought to the table. All servers are masked and gloved. The toy corner is closed for hygiene reasons but will be back in operation as soon as it's safe. Anita and Diets will be continuing food deliveries for those still isolating and plan to open for evening functions when practicable.

All services run with reduced numbers to ensure social distancing is met and vehicles continue to be deep cleaned and wiped down with alcohol gel frequently to keep everyone safe.

FIGHTING FOOD WASTE - FEEDING FAMILIES

During the lockdown period, Havens Community Hub volunteers were asked to partner with FareShare, the biggest national organisation that redistributes excess supermarket produce and also to support the work of the Co-op Food Share scheme.

Thousands of kilos of food are being binned by stores at the end of the day due to being too short-dated for food banks to be able to collect and redistribute immediately.

The Hub has formed a network of volunteers to redistribute these goods within two hours of collection and has so far prevented over two tonnes of edible surplus food from entering landfill - which would have created over 7,000kg of harmful greenhouse gasses.

Recipients of the food have included isolated, shielded or lonely residents, families who have had children off school since April, people suffering financial instability due to job losses or furlough and people interested in supporting the environment by feeding bellies, not bins!

Any part of the donation that could be used by local food banks is delivered to them by Hub volunteers, however, the majority of donations are unsuitable due to the short dates. The Hub has supported food banks in other ways by providing them with tinned and packet goods and lending volunteer drivers from their newly formed 'Havens Community Cars' scheme.

The Hub would like to thank the staff of the local Co-op, Tesco and Asda stores for being part of this amazing new initiative.



Keeping safe from coronavirus

- a job for East Sussex together

It's my job to try and ensure as few of us as possible in East Sussex get infected with Covid-19 – but I need your help.

The good news is that, at the moment, East Sussex has low rates of the virus compared to some other parts of England.

But of course the virus is still there in our communities.

If there were a local outbreak, I or other public health leaders might ask you to avoid certain places or even to stay at home, as the situation is controlled.

We'd let you know about this very swiftly, for example on local television, radio and online. You can also sign up now for email updates which we'd send if anything new happens. (You'll find a link on the homepage of the East Sussex County Council website).

Of course, I hope this will never be necessary and we can all work together to avoid outbreaks.

Above all, please:

- Keep 2 metres apart from other people wherever you can
- regularly wash your hands
- wear a facemask in shops and other enclosed public places
- if you feel at all unwell (a new persistent cough, a change in smell or taste, or a raised temperature) immediately book a test and stay at home for at least 10 days. Book a test online at nhs.uk or call 119 if you have trouble using the internet.
- If you are asked to self-isolate by the NHS test and trace team, please do.

On the county council website you'll also find latest details about the number of cases where you live, our plan for how we'd handle any outbreak in the county and lots of practical help and support.

Our communities have already done amazing work to support each other through these tough times. We can keep the virus at bay in East Sussex if we continue working together.
