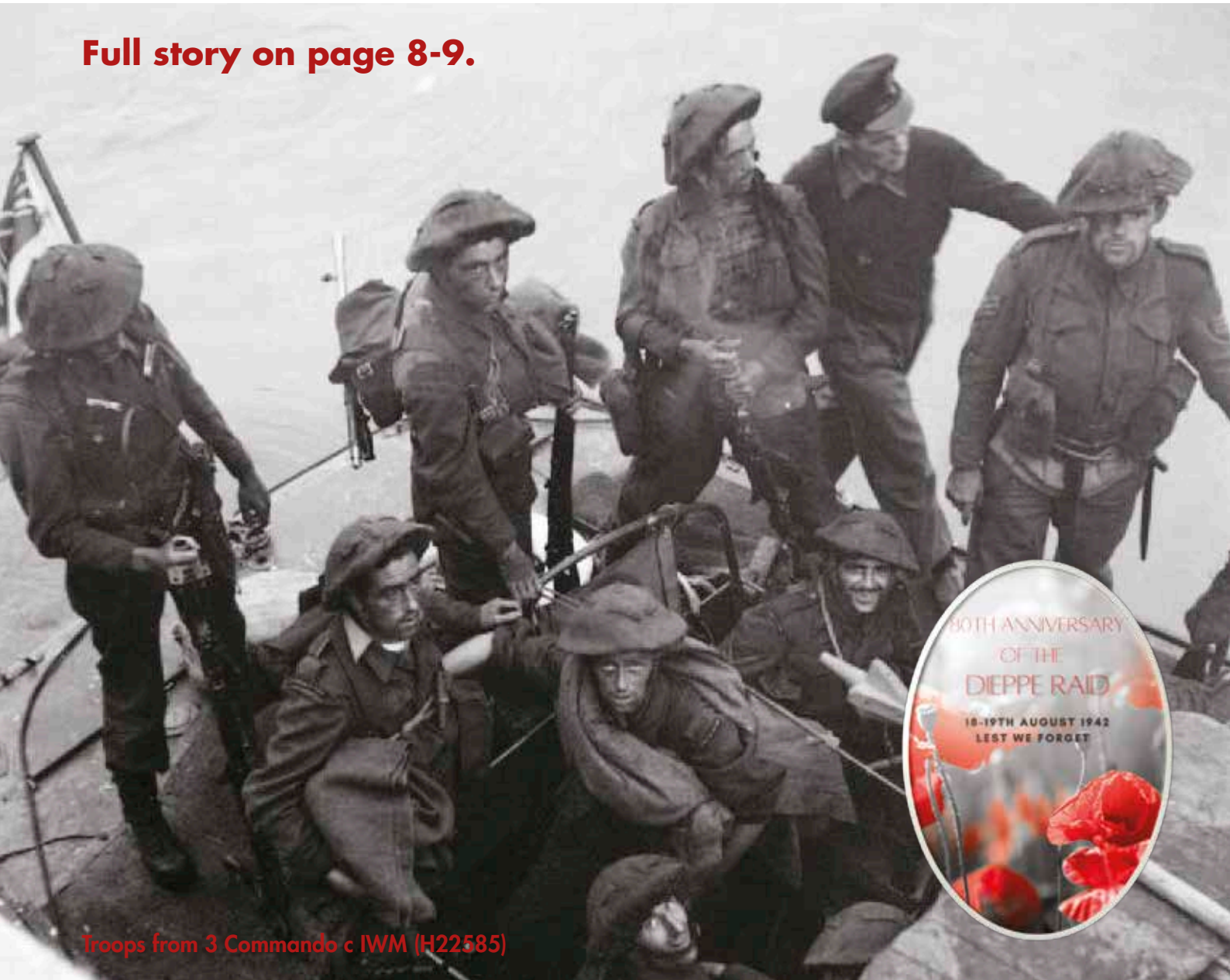

Handing on the Mayoral Chain

*New Mayor & Deputy Mayor Elected for
Newhaven for 2022-2023*



During the Town Council's Annual Meeting which took place on Tuesday 10th May, former Newhaven Town Mayor, Cllr. Lesley Boniface handed over the Mayoral Chains of Office to the newly elected Mayor, Cllr. Paul Boswell.

A well-known face around Newhaven, Cllr. Boswell was first co-opted to the Town Council over ten years ago and this is the second time that he has held the Mayoral position.

Mayor Cllr. Paul Boswell said, "Having been a local councillor for at least the past ten years, I'm honoured to have been selected to serve as mayor for a 2nd time. During the coming year . . . I would like to bring back some events to our town. The pram race to name but one. I also plan to hold a 'clean up' day in the Autumn and will be calling for volunteers to help litter pick on the principal areas around the town centre. My chosen charity for the year is Havens Community Hub and soon we'll be letting you all know how you can help us to help them".

His Deputy will be Cllr. Pinky McLean-Knight who replaces former Deputy Mayor Cllr. George Taylor.

Deputy Mayor, Cllr. McLean-Knight said, "I am so very proud and humbled to have been voted in as the first Independent Deputy Mayor in Newhaven for some time. I am looking forward to working with Cllr. Boswell whom I have known for some years. Those who know me, understand that I have a very great passion for this town, and it's been a tough couple of years with some bleak outlooks. My wish is to continue to contribute to long term stronger mental health, raise up & bring together Newhaven's diversity whilst lighting up the towns collective community spirits this year! Council launches plans that will ‘make a difference’ across district

Lewes District Council has embarked on an ambitious and far-reaching programme of community projects that will see a host of new developments and improvements across the district over the next 12 months.

The projects include a renewal of play areas, new sports facilities, green initiatives that will increase biodiversity in the district, tackle the impact of climate change and help the council become carbon net zero by 2030. There will also be greater access to the countryside, a new wetland and wildflower meadows created, more tree planting and enhancements in local parks and gardens.

Councillor Zoe Nicholson, Leader of Lewes District Council, said: “I am obviously delighted that the plans we are announcing today will make a difference in communities all over Lewes district.

“These are very tough time for many residents and as a council we will do all we can to help, that includes investing in our play areas and green spaces, which everyone can enjoy.”

This week councillors visited Hoath Wood (pictured) to see how council officers are working with the Sussex Flow Initiative, a partnership including Sussex Wildlife Trust, to implement natural flood management measures such as leaky dams, to reduce the risks of flooding

during prolonged periods of wet weather.

Councillor James MacCleary, Deputy Leader of Lewes District Council, added: *“It was great to see how our officers and our partners are using natural resources in Hoath Wood to slow down the flow of water. Flooding has long been a problem for residents in this part of Newhaven and it’s brilliant to see action to address that while remaining in absolute harmony with the woodland environment. I am also very excited to see local play areas being upgraded across the district. As a dad with two young children, I know how important these facilities are to parents. It is these sorts of investments in our community’s future that make me proud of the work our Alliance has done since taking over the council in 2019”.*

The council is developing a website where residents can visit and see all the initiatives that will benefit local communities.

Councillor Chris Collier, Cabinet Member for Performance and People, said: *“The Co-operative Alliance has the health and wellbeing of all communities in the district at the heart of everything we do.*

“It is heartening and a source of great pride for me and all my colleagues to have funded a raft of projects that will bring so many different benefits and enhancements to the district”.

OPERATION JUBILEE

August 19th will be the 80th anniversary of the Dieppe Raid

The war wasn't going well in the early Summer of 1942. Hong Kong and Singapore had fallen to the Japanese, our Eighth Army in North Africa (The Desert Rats) had been driven back into Egypt and the Russians were fighting for their lives at Stalingrad and were agitating for some action by the Allies to relieve the pressure on the Red Army. Angry crowds, in London and other cities, urged on by the press, were demanding a "Second Front" and an end to our long succession of withdrawals.

Against this backdrop plans were drawn up for a large-scale raid on the French coast with attacks at five different points on a 16-kilometre front with the port of Dieppe being the main target. The troops involved would total 6100 of whom about 5000 were Canadians, the remainder being British Commandos and 50 American Rangers. The Canadians who had been straining at the leash for some time in their training camps in England (many were

billeted in Newhaven) would form the force for the frontal assault on Dieppe itself whilst the Commandos would be responsible for silencing the German coastal batteries to the east and west of the port.

The raid, code named Jubilee, was to include the landing of specially modified tanks and was supported by a naval force of eight destroyers and 74 allied air squadrons. After several revisions of the plans and a delay due to bad weather, the attack took place on August 19th 1942.

It was a disaster

As the assault force approached the coast of France in the early morning it unexpectedly encountered a small convoy of German ships. The noise of the sea fight which followed fully alerted the enemy coastal

defences so that when the troops landed, they were subjected to withering machine gun and mortar fire from well-placed defensive positions. The main force of Canadians was pinned down on the beaches, the tanks were unable to manoeuvre on the shingle and a breakdown in communications resulted in reinforcements continuing to be landed into a hopeless situation where they could neither advance to their objectives or withdraw. Eventually, after heavy casualties, surrender was the only option.

By early afternoon Operation Jubilee was over. There had been some successful actions. The commandos had been able to silence the heavy coastal batteries thus minimising the shelling of the landing craft and small forces of Canadians had moved forward from the beaches but were unable to achieve their objectives.

Of the 4,963 Canadian troops who embarked for the operation over 900 lost their lives and 1,945 were taken prisoner. Only 2,210 returned to England. The RAF lost 105 aircraft and the RCAF loss was 13 aircraft.

Extract from Len Patton's story before leaving Newhaven

At the beginning of July, we loaded our tanks and men of the Calgary Tank Regiment and sailed from Southampton to Newhaven where we berthed in a tiny estuary called Sleepers Hole in which the entire LCT flotilla squeezed in twelve abreast. There was no leave allowed and from July 3rd we remained there fully loaded for several days.

We had about fifty Canadian soldiers together with the tank crews aboard who during daylight were forbidden, for security reason, to show themselves above the canvas covering. At night we were allowed to come up on deck. The conditions in the tank deck were terrible as it was the height of summer. One evening, to entertain us we were shown a film in one of the dockside warehouses. The film called 'Dangerous Moonlight', was a real tearjerker and not at all appropriate given the

seriousness of the forthcoming operation.

On 7th July we were told the operation was to be abandoned and we returned to Southampton where we were given leave.

On our return from leave we sailed almost immediately for Newhaven again. This time our ships were empty.

During the evening of Monday 17th August tanks from the Calgary Tank Regiment

stationed at Seaford, made their way through Newhaven and down towards the loading hards in the harbour area. Under cover of darkness the tanks were loaded. In total we carried four Churchill tanks and a bulldozer.

Return to Newhaven

Operation Jubilee was over and the survivors were on their way back to Newhaven, the designated casualty reception port, whilst the German prisoners were marched through the town on their way to captivity.

Sooty RN

Ship's Cat 1st Class Sooty RN outside the RNVR Drill Hall after her return from the Dieppe Raid.

Sooty was the ship's cat on Landing Craft Tank no.5 which was severely damaged by enemy gunfire and sunk off Red Beach. Sooty managed to swim clear and despite the appalling conditions at Dieppe showed great fortitude, courage and perseverance whilst clinging to a crewman's steel helmet, all under heavy fire. Sooty RN behaved throughout in a most worthy and sea cat manner.

By the morning of Tuesday 18th August loading had been completed and final embarkation of personnel began. In Newhaven harbour, embarkation of Commandos and other personnel began in their small landing craft (LCPs) called Eurekas.

Of the total land-based force of 4,963 Canadians engaged in the operation only 2,210, many of them wounded, returned to Newhaven leaving behind 907 dead and 1,946 prisoners.

More than two hundred little ships were escorted back to Newhaven, where many craft had to lie offshore for hours with wounded on board, while waiting for harbour space. In fact, arrangements for the reception of the wounded had broken down. Cot cases had to be hoisted out of the small craft by crane and laboriously brought on shore. To make matters worse the hospital train, which had been made available, was routed for Birmingham: cases of urgent surgical attention suffered

A special one-off Dieppe Raid Medal was posthumously awarded to Sooty RN at the 50th Anniversary 1992. The citation also notes that Sooty RN was the only female present in the entire force.



On the evening of Tuesday 18th August our tank landing craft flotilla sailed at dusk from Newhaven harbour. At 11.30pm the Shoreham and Newhaven forces met and headed towards a channel in the German minefield.

many painful hours of waiting and travel.

The official comment drily states the obvious: 'Hospitals in the immediate vicinity should be used in preference to ones further away, even if not the same service or unit'.

Newhaven played a major part in the Dieppe Raid. Many troops, tanks and equipment left for Dieppe from Newhaven, and some 200 small ships were escorted back to Newhaven carrying the survivors.

PERMANENT MEMORIAL TO SIX FISHERMEN UNVEILED

On the 28th April, Local Town Councillor (then Town Mayor), Cllr. Lesley Boniface joined over 100 people, including local residents, members of the RNLI and local MP, Maria Caulfield for the unveiling of the Newhaven Fishermen's Memorial.

Designed by local artist Christian Funnell, The Newhaven Fishermen's

Memorial was erected following a campaign by the family and friends of Robert Morley, who drowned when his vessel, the Joanna C, sank in November 2020.

The sculpture, which is of a bait ball with mackerel swimming around it, was unveiled on what would have been Robert's 40th birthday and stands on the edge of the port, alongside the river.

Along with Robert Morley, the memorial is also dedicated to five other fishermen who have sadly lost their lives off the Sussex coast. Adam Harper

(Joanna C), Darren Brown (Our Sarah Jane), Joe Bowen, Andrew Penfold and John Ship (all from the Sylvia Marita).

Cllr. Lesley Boniface said *"having a permanent memorial is great for the families and wider community to be able to reflect on the loss and sacrifices made daily by our fishermen. It's been a privilege to be able to work with Robert Morley's family to provide this installation"*.

They will forever be in our thoughts.

Well-known Newhaven couple, Janet and Mike Bond will be setting off to pastures new as they plan a new life in Spain.

The Bonds' have lived in Newhaven for 40 years, with Janet gaining all her Teaching Qualifications via Newhaven Adult Education Centre before becoming their Examination Typing Tutor, Keep Fit Teacher and eventually qualified for the post of Head of the Centre, which she ran as a self-funding provision for 5 years before Lewes Tertiary College took over.

This was the theme that the town of La Chapelle Saint Mesmin took for a busy weekend of celebrations of ten years of Twinning between their town and Newhaven.

37 members of Newhaven Twinning Association travelled to La Chapelle Saint Mesmin to join in. Half of us travelled as foot passengers on the ferry to Dieppe, where we were collected by a coach and taken to La Chapelle Saint Mesmin. The rest of us travelled in our own cars, as we planned to take the opportunity to spend more time in France, for most of us the first time since the start of the pandemic.

Official customs and passport checks were less onerous than we had expected, and we were soon on our way.

We were all hosted by people

of the town, many of whom have become our good friends over the past ten years. We were greeted at the Espace Béaire, a large community centre, with gifts of local vinegar, mustard, and potted meat, then off to a late supper with our host families.

The following day was filled with celebrations. A parade (seemingly of most of the townspeople) with a British theme, started the day - Mary Poppins, Harry Potter and a large red telephone box were in evidence - as was the band and a very large amount of paper confetti!

Following a flash mob dance, there were speeches, and a presentation of gifts. Newhaven Twinning Association gave the town a British post box, and a large canvas print of the Newhaven

lifeboat returning to the harbour in a storm, and they gave us a painting of their town hall in autumn. Flowers to the chairpersons of both associations were, naturally, red, white and blue.

We were served a "vin d'honneur" (a glass of sparkling wine) and then had a buffet brunch.

Thus restored, we had a full afternoon. Various local associations put on displays, activities, and tours. The Photographic Society displayed photos of the area, the historical society gave talks in French and English, the Retro Society paraded a collection of vintage and classic British cars, and we learned the legend of the dragon, while visiting his cave. This also explained the name of La Chapelle Saint Mesmin.





In the 6th century, King Clovis sent a monk to establish a monastery on the other side of the river Loire, along with the monk's nephew Mesmin. Local legend claimed there was a terrible dragon in a cave overlooking the river, who terrorised the local population. Mesmin crossed the river and killed the dragon with a flaming torch. In gratitude, the people built a chapel on the bank above the cave. The original chapel was burnt, but a later one dating from the 11th century is still there, so giving the town its name

At the end of the afternoon, it was very pleasant to escape from the 28°C heat and sit in the shade of the park to listen to a concert given by the Harmonie de La Chapelle Saint Mesmin, a wind and percussion band.

We just had time to return to our host's homes to freshen up and then we all went to the celebration dinner and dance. As well as a four-course dinner, with wine of course, we were entertained by the eight-piece band, the Orchestre Fabien Thomas. Dancing continued until late, when we returned again to our hosts, clutching another present of glasses from the local Duralex factory, a special edition in red, white and blue.

The following day was if anything, even hotter, and there were various activities. The local walking group organised walks of 5, 10 and 15 kilometres, there were trips to local chateaux and a barbecue among other events.

In the afternoon, some of us played pétanque at the local pétanque club, and we also tried our hands at Mölkke, a fun sort of skittles game. The threatened thunderstorm passed us by and we were able to finish the game without getting soaked.

We then went back for a quiet evening with our host families.

The following morning it was time to say farewell, but not before we were offered a brunch in the Espace Béaire and a final group photograph.

The groups travelling by coach then set off for Dieppe, while the rest of the group departed for their various destinations in France.

We ended up with a respectable showing – well off last place in both the Men's and Women's categories which wasn't bad considering the age of our club. Roll on next year!

"Growing your own food, it's like printing your own money"

As mounting food costs and bills soar growing your own food is going to become a necessity rather than a hobby. It's like a quiet act of revolution and you're saving the planet too. Have you noticed supermarkets don't seem to have all the stock you need at the moment..., well with the Climate Crisis we are facing this will only get worse. But there are solutions and they come by connecting with the community and finding a growing space for you and your family, whether that's in your own back garden or if you don't have one in a local green space or community garden.

Unfortunately, freedom given to developers for house building has meant that we have up to 40% less provision for green spaces and this has had a huge societal effect. Research shows the role public green spaces play in better educational outcomes, physical health and mental and social wellbeing, resilience and recovery.

Nestled in Yorkshires Calderdale valley lies the

village of Todmorden, the starting place of the group Incredible Edibles, which took over its towns public green spaces and has turned them into edible spaces run and maintained by the community.

Far across the water in Los Angeles a man called Ron Finley decided to grow on his sidewalk, in an area known as a food desert. I highly recommend his Ted Talk, incredibly inspirational story of one man and his mission to get fresh food into some of the poorest communities.

Here in Newhaven, we are lucky to have green spaces around us and community growing projects, all run by volunteers from the community. Having spent the last year volunteering at some of these groups I know how good it is for my wellbeing. Being with supportive people, teaching me skills and enjoying a share of the organic produce I bring home.

Growing together Newhaven has a beautiful space on the clifftops where they offer various sessions with

a fantastic "Whatever the weather Forest School". Kids enjoy an incredible space and get to do activities many of us can't do at home. Denton has a new community garden opening designed by the children for the children.

FOUR MILE DASH TO SAVE PILOT - 70 YEARS ON

On Wednesday 18th May, at Newhaven Fort where I work, I found myself drawn to an artefact in one of our storerooms, where it has lain since 2007 when it was donated. Resting among the ladders, wood and metal sheeting is an aircraft propeller boss and reduction gear, trawled up by local fishermen of NN444 off Peacehaven. That day in fact was 70 years to the day of how this propeller came to rest on the seabed-suffice to say, I'm now considering options of where it can at last be displayed for visitors to see.

On the morning of May 18th, 1952, 24 year old Naval pilot John F Plant was on a training flight out of RNAS Ford (HMS Peregrine) flying Blackburn Firebrand serial no.EK724 of 827Sqn, Fleet Air Arm. The Firebrand torpedo fighter had been developed during the Second World War but entered service too late to see combat use-eventually only being used by 827 & 813 Sqn of the

FAA until replaced by the Westland Wyvern. Despite its powerful credentials, powered by a Bristol Centaurus engine, armed with four 20mm cannon and capable of carrying an 18" torpedo, sixteen rockets or two 2000lb bombs, the Firebrand never lived up to its name. Many FAA pilots saying, "she was built like a battleship & flew like one too!" While off Beachy Head, Plant reported the engine had started misfiring. Trying to limp back to base, he lost engine power off Peacehaven and was left with no option but to ditch in the sea.

Fortunately for Plant, the crash was witnessed by residents of Peacehaven who telephoned the Police and Newhaven based RAF 1107 Air Sea

Rescue unit. Heading out to sea at top speed - "We have been waiting for this for this for nearly five years. It is the first one we've had since the end of the War!", was ARS launch no.2557 under the command of Flying Officer 'Dinghy' Chivers and Coxswain Flight Sergeant 'Geordie' Love.

Four miles out at sea, the crew found Plant "floating around in his rubber dinghy which had been attached to his parachute harness". Taken aboard 2557, Plant was returned to dry land at Newhaven safe & well after twenty minutes at sea.

As for Firebrand EK724, she rests at the bottom of the sea, minus her propeller!

A food waste prevention project has a double celebration after rescuing its 250,000th meal equivalent and being named Best Environmental Business at the prestigious Seahaven Business Awards.

In April 2020, during the pandemic lockdown period, Havens Food Cooperative (a project of the Havens Community Hub) started putting together a team of volunteers who would visit supermarkets at night to collect and rapidly redistribute food that had simply reached its 'best-before' date and was due to be sent to landfill, creating more Co2 gas and wasting perfectly edible perishable goods such as fruit, vegetables, bread and other bakery items.

These items could not be given to traditional food banks as their still-useable life was limited and most local food banks only open one day per week - the collected food needed to be redistributed within 24 hours.

Starting with only three local stores, the project grew until - in December 2021 - the final supermarket joined the cooperative of stores helping to prevent food waste - and now

EVERY single supermarket in the Havens Area (Saltdean to Seaford) on the coastal stretch are contributors to the scheme, helping to prevent over 1 tonne of food from being wasted every week.

The project has redistributed, free of charge, over 108 tonnes of perishable food to the community (preventing 336,900kg of Co2), prioritising people who might need some support and providing over 14 'pop up pantry partners' such as youth clubs, environmental alliances, schools and more with free food for their groups and members.

The project is run by Paula Woolven and Fran Lowton and is supported by over 25 volunteers. Founder of the Hub, Paula, appeared on 'Come Dine With Me' in 2021, cooking with leftover produce, to raise awareness of the project and food waste prevention in general. The project is open 365 days a year and is a never-ending collection and redistribution service. Even on Christmas Day, volunteers can be found at their base in Thompson Road, Denton redistributing and preventing waste.

The project is about to start a 'slow cooker' set of lessons,

as cooking in these appliances can save up to 80% of electricity charges as opposed to traditional oven and hob costs. Families without slow cookers can also apply to receive one free of charge from the Food Cooperative. This incredibly important step forward has been part-funded by Councillor Christine Brett, Chair of Lewes District Council, and will be starting in June as a rapid response to the fuel price hike.

We have also started running a monthly Repair Café at Meeching Hall, 2A Fort Road BN9 9QQ. These are events where you can bring any broken household goods – from toasters to jeans - for our repairers to try to fix – all completely free! It's a great way of saving money and keeping things out of landfill. Our 'customers' so far have all left happy, with nearly all of their items fully fixed.

Repairers include Lee from UBM Tool Hire and Kat Neeser from 'Sew in Brighton'.

Helen Ford will also be on hand to teach you and help you with hand sewing repairs. The next Repair Cafés are on June 12th and July 10th, both 2.30-4.30pm.

We are working on getting a Sharing Library up and running and are now accepting donations for the library. We already have some DIY tools and camping equipment.

And we are able to accept some items for recycling that you can't put into the council-run kerbside collections: all plastics (even broken toys), blister packs (which tablets come in), contact lenses, corks, used cosmetics and other toiletries (ie toothpaste tubes), rags (worn-out clothes and shoes). 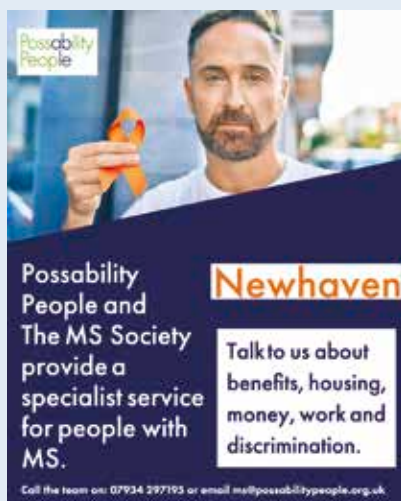

For beginners, the club provides a good selection of carving chisels as well as hand & electric tools, for use in the club. We also “provide” a friendly and helpful environment with advice & support from experienced members.



Possability People is a local charity that supports people with long term health conditions, including MS. We believe in supporting people to live independently, with dignity and without prejudice.

Multiple sclerosis (MS) is a neurological condition - that means it affects your nerves. You get it when your immune system isn't working properly.

Your immune system normally protects you by fighting off infection, but in MS it attacks your nerves by mistake. Your nerves control lots of different

parts of your body. That's why you can get MS symptoms in many parts of your body. It's also why everyone's MS is different.

Once diagnosed, MS stays with you for life, but treatments and specialists can help you to manage the condition and its symptoms.

Our staff team are experts. They want you to be able to get on with your life without worrying about money, the benefits you are entitled to, housing or council tax.

If you or someone you know has MS and needs advice, please call our lovely team on 07934 297195 or email ms@possabilitypeople.org.uk.

If you or a family member need extra help because of a long-term illness, disability or mental health condition, money may be available towards paying for it.

The main benefits are:

- Disability Living Allowance DLA (for children under 16)
- Personal Independence Payment PIP (for those aged 16 to State Pension age when applying)
- Attendance Allowance AA (for people eligible for a State Pension)

If your child needs a lot more care, attention or supervision than a child of the same age

who isn't disabled or has difficulty walking or getting around outdoors in unfamiliar places, compared to a child of the same age who isn't disabled, you may be eligible for DLA.

You may be eligible for PIP if you struggle to do everyday tasks or to get around because of a physical or mental condition. You don't need to have worked or to have paid National Insurance to qualify.

Rates of DLA and PIP vary from £23.70 to £152.15 weekly.

You could get £60.00 or £89.60 a week Attendance Allowance. It won't affect your pension and may help you live independently, longer.

You can spend the money however you like. They are not means tested. It doesn't matter what other money you have, or whether you are still working.

You have to complete a long claim form when you apply for PIP or AA. But help is available from your Citizens Advice so don't let the form put you off applying.

How can I offer a UK home to Ukrainian refugees?

Anyone in the UK can apply to be a host through the government website providing they have at least six months' leave to remain in the UK.

Home-owners with a mortgage should contact their lender before accepting refugees to avoid a breach of mortgage terms.

Tenants should check their tenancy agreement - they may require their landlord's permission.

Leaseholders should check the terms of their lease to see whether they are permitted to have lodgers or subtenants.

Hosts must be able to offer refugees accommodation for at least six months.

Those offering to house refugees will be vetted by the government, and Ukrainian applicants will also undergo security checks before being matched with a host.

Local authorities will check that properties are fit to host refugees, and DBS checks will be carried out for those hosting children and vulnerable adults.

Those who don't personally know anyone fleeing Ukraine can register their interest on the government's website and consult charities working to pair sponsors with refugees such as:

- Refugees at Home
- Room for Refugees
- Shelter 4 Ukraine
- Reset

Host households in the UK will be offered a tax-free thank-you payment of £350 a month for up to 12 months. This payment does not affect benefit entitlement and will remain tax-free.

While hosts cannot charge rent the government advises an agreement such as an Excluded License Agreement or an Excluded Tenancy Agreement be drawn up to ensure all parties are clear on the terms of the arrangement.
