

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY 2022

Over 40 poppy wreaths were laid at Newhaven's three memorials on Sunday 13th November to remember all those who lost their lives in World War I, World War II and other conflicts since then.

The service, conducted by Bishop Bill Musk at St Michaels Church was followed by a parade down to Memorial Green for two minutes silence and wreath laying, led by the Deputy Lieutenant David Allum DL.

We were delighted that all of Newhaven's youth groups and schools attended, including representatives from Nippers.

We would like to thank everyone who took part to remember the fallen.



Rev. Martin Miller Awarded **Honorary Freeman** of Newhaven

After 17 years' service to St Michaels Church, Rev. Martin Miller has been awarded Honorary Freeman of Newhaven.

Before 1835, the right to the Freedom could be obtained by purchase or gift, or could arise from birth, marriage or apprenticeship to a Freeman much depended upon the Charter and individual customs of a particular Borough. Freemen formed part of the Corporation, were entitled to a voice in the Municipal Government, were entitled to pursue their occupation within the Borough boundaries and were normally exempt from

local customs, dues and tolls. They also had the right to vote at the Parliamentary Elections. In a number of Boroughs they were, until 1932, the only electors.

In the reforms of the 1830s the rights and privileges of Freemen were severely curtailed and the Municipal Corporations Act of 1835 provided that none should be admitted by gift or purchase. Subsequent claims have only been made on the grounds of birth, marriage or apprenticeship and although the system still operates within the City of London, elsewhere the practice has largely fallen into disuse. The establishment of the universal adult franchise in 1918 effectively ended distinctions between individuals and social classes in their political rights.

Today the Honorary Freedom of the Town carries no privileges other than purely



ceremonial. There is no exemption from tolls or rates and no special voting privileges. It is, however, a singular honour indicative of the respect in which the individual so honoured is held within the local community.

In October, Ken Dry, Clerk of Newhaven Town Council, Newhaven Mayor Cllr Paul Boswell and Newhaven Chamber of Commerce delighted to host a delegation from the Vietnamese Embassy in London and Ms Le Thi Kim Dung, the Chairwoman of The Provincial People's Council in Tuyen Quang, one of the

They visited the Ho Chi Minh memorial in Newhaven Marina and the RNLI building, explaining much of the history and business development

in Newhaven. At the Council Offices afterwards, the visitors were keen to discuss how our local government and Councils worked together for the benefit our decisions made their way to County level and then to Central Government. They wanted to understand how our experiences could contribute to their way of governance in develop trade links between Newhaven businesses and Viet Nam.



PLANTING IN HONOUR OF TWIN TOWN MAYOR

On a breezy but dry morning on 10th November, members of Newhaven Twinning Association, representatives of Newhaven's twin town La Chapelle Saint Mesmin and councillors, met on Denton Island in Newhaven to plant a tree in memory of former La Chapelle Saint Mesmin mayor Nicolas Bonneau, who died suddenly two years ago.

The above date was chosen as it was when the Twinning Charter was signed in Newhaven in 2011.



Nicolas was instrumental in establishing and supporting the twinning process and

took an active part in all the activities and visits. His love of music has meant that a memorial bench has been placed on Denton Island, close to the bandstand. This was a gift from the Amy family, who formed very close bonds

with the Bonneau family and the Twinning Association. To complete the memorial the Twinning Association supported by NTC organised the planting of a tree close to the bench.

Councillor Graham Amy led a tribute to Nicolas, with La Chapelle Saint Mesmin Deputy Mayor David Gomes, accompanied by his wife Manuela Gomes, read a message from Nicolas's widow and children and then planted a sessile oak, close

to a memorial bench that had already been placed.

The ceremony was led by the chairperson of Newhaven Twinning Association, Mrs Alison Thomas, who read a touching French poem, le Train de ma Vie by Jean d'Ormesson.

The Mayor of Newhaven, Councillor Paul Boswell and the Consul Honoraire M Frederick Laloux also attended the ceremony.

Afterwards refreshments were taken at the Sidings.





Your Newhaven Update and Launch of Safe Spaces Map

In the previous issue of Newhaven Matters, Cllr James MacCleary provided an update on funded regeneration projects and the launch of Your Newhaven.


Since then, the site has gained hundreds of subscribers and residents have been providing some incredibly useful feedback. The results of surveys and the actions being taken in response are provided in the 'Results' section. The site is designed to consolidate consultation and improve partner working across the town, as well as keep residents updated on progress.

One of the major developments in response to comments has been the launch of a new 'Safe Spaces map', so we can get an even better understanding of where and why you feel safe, or unsafe, in particular places. Everyone should be able to feel safe visiting any area of Newhaven – results so far have indicated that there is a lot more that can be done to help achieve this, and more questions to ask.

The map is intended to support the work Sussex Police are already undertaking in this area but will also provide really useful data to inform some of the projects which are being funded through the Towns Fund, and Future High Streets Fund.

Lewes District Council will also be attending community events and working with local community venues to increase access to the map and provide additional in-person engagement.







NOTICE OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION

A SUSTAINABLE **NEW COMMUNITY** AT HARBOUR **HEIGHTS**

A community consultation is being launched regarding a sustainable new community of 400 new homes, including affordable housing, and employment space at Harbour Heights, Newhaven.

The site, which lies to the north of Court Farm Road, has already been identified for development in the adopted Lewes Core Strategy.

Part of the land is already developed, and includes

Quarry Road Industrial Estate, which is built on the site of the former Meeching Quarry.

The industrial estate would be redeveloped with a mixture of homes, shops, employment space, and new community facilities.

The land to its west, which has also been allocated for development, will be used to provide the rest of the housing along with a large open public space for the enjoyment of all, known as Shell Park.

The development is being promoted by Savills with BECG providing specialist support regarding community engagement.

A public consultation dropin session will be held on

Wednesday 18th January 2023 between 4pm - 7pm at The Hillcrest Centre, Bay Vue Road, Newhaven, BN9 9LH.

In addition, a virtual exhibition is hosted at newhaven. consultationonline.co.uk and will be available for comment until 25th January 2023.





Wednesday in November, the intrepid BN9 Newhaven Tree Wardens planted 8 HUGE trees around the children's play area at Lewes Road Rec to provide some shade and diversity to the location.

THE NEWHAVEN FISH FESTIVAL THANKS TO NATIONAL LOTTERY PLAYERS

Sussex Community Development Association is awarded a £36,449 grant by The National Lottery Heritage Fund to engage local communities in 'Newhaven Heritage Routes'

SCDA has received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of £36,449 for an exciting heritage project, Newhaven Heritage Routes, based from the Newhaven Active Travel Hub. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the project will focus on engaging local communities in discovering and sharing the natural, industrial and maritime heritage of Newhaven and its connections with surrounding towns and villages.

Supported through the Heritage Fund, the project will launch in January 2023 and will bring local people together in peer groups with local historian, Dr Jenny Flood, to create unique local heritage walking and cycling trails. With this project, we

will engage the community in exploring the history of the town's development, and how it links with the present-day landscape.

We want to help people from across Newhaven to get actively involved in this project. Working with the local community historian and Newhaven Museum. participants have the opportunity to tell their own stories, capture stories from friends and families, and visit local places of interest. Activities will bring together archive material and local memories in a new way and make this information accessible in the form of Newhaven Heritage Route trail leaflets and guided walks and rides.

Come, share your thoughts and feelings, and listen to others, supported by a skilled facilitator.

What to expect

Perhaps you have begun to worry about what is happening to our climate and what this might mean for you and your family and friends, also for other species.

The focus of discussion in a Climate Café is the participant's immediate thoughts and feelings, rather than what we are doing (or not doing) about it. In a word we make space for the trouble, instead of merely wishing it away. It is a simple, friendly hospitable space where fears, uncertainties and other difficult feelings can be safely expressed and acknowledged. This allows for a conversation without pre-set themes or objectives in mind, other than how you are affected by the climate emergency and related biodiversity crisis.

FREE. Everyone is welcome: Coffee, teas and cake provided.

That this is happening for real is taken as read. Accordingly it is NOT an event for arguing about the validity of the science. It is also an advice-free zone with no pressure to take action, join a group or change your mind on anything.

You may on a previous occasion, in some other context, have felt shut down when you have tried to voice your concerns. Perhaps someone else found the topic too difficult or challenging. With this in mind Climate Cafes have 5 simple guidelines:

Say what you really, actually feel

Take it in turns to speak. Be mindful of how much space you are taking up; and try not to interrupt others.

Observe confidentiality i.e. you don't report what others said to third parties who were not present.

Listen and take an interest in other's views, and don't try to impose your own. Silence is fine. So is anger. Tears also have a place.

Our photo this time shows the French car ferry Villandry taking out the early evening sailing from Newhaven to Dieppe in 1978.

'Villandry' was the first purpose-built car ferry for the Newhaven-Dieppe route and made her inaugural crossing on the 16th of May, 1965, joining the British car ferry 'Falaise', which had started the service almost a year earlier. 'Villandry' would be joined by her twin sister 'Valencay' on the 7th of July. The three ships would be the mainstay of the service until the arrival of 'Senlac' in 1973.

'Villandry' and' Valencay'
were, on the whole, solid,
reliable ships. I called them
workhorses, the late Peter
Bailey would describe
them less generously as
'plodders'. They weren't the
most comfortable of ships,
with much plastic seating
throughout – that's if you could
actually find a seat on busy

crossings! But if you got on board early enough you could grab a seat at the front of the Salon Panoramique – the upper row of windows just below the ship's bridge. It was a great view!

A development of the earlier French ferry 'Compiegne', they were stylish ships but their looks were somewhat spoiled in late 1976. They were 'sliced' horizontally and extra height added to the car deck for more lorries – you can see the step up in the side windows. A bow door and visor were added to allow for drive-through operations and the diminutive funnel gained a less than attractive 'hat'.

I'm sure that many Newhaven residents who knew these ships in the 1960s and 1970s will recall the sound of their diesel engines. On a calm summer's day you could hear the distinct thump-thump-thump from miles away!

After leaving the Newhaven-Dieppe route, both 'Villandry' and 'Valencay' went on to have long careers, under various names, in the Mediterranean, on the Greek inter-island services, lasting until 1998 and 2003 respectively.

EYES ALONG THE COAST



The National Coastwatch Institution (NCI) was founded 28 years ago and has the mission to

assist in the preservation of life at sea and along our coastline. There are currently 58 NCI stations around the coast of England and Wales staffed by 2,600 trained volunteers. NCI is a charity No 1159975 and functions as a declared facility of HM Coastquard.

NCI Newhaven was founded in 2004, so 2022 marks eighteen years of continuous community service without a single day of watchkeeping missed, except during the initial compulsory eight-week Covid-19 lockdown in 2020. There are currently just over seventy trained volunteers staffing NCI

Newhaven watching for vulnerable persons, at sea or on the coast, or vessels in danger.

NCI Newhaven lookout is on Castle Hill 175 feet above sea level. On a clear day, a total exceeding 400 square miles can be observed. There is very good coverage for VHF radio reception.

The NCI holds a national OfCom licence for the exclusive use of VHF Channel 65 which facilitates communications between our lookout and seafarers. The duty watchkeepers can respond to requests from vessels for radio checks in addition to providing actual weather and sea state conditions. Call on VHF channel 65. Our call sign is Newhaven NCI.

Visitors are normally welcome at the lookout although, when an incident is ongoing, the duty watchkeepers may ask visitors to call back later.

THE FRIENDS **OF TIDE MILLS**


RING OUT THE OLD, RING IN THE NEW

By October next year the quiet village of Piddinghoe will resound to something new yet familiar. It will be the ringing of the newly restored church bells, calling us to worship, baptisms, weddings and farewells at St John the Evangelist. After 300 years, the current 3 bells (made in the 18th century) will be taken down and transported to a Bell Engineering Company, Blyth & Co. On their return, they will be joined by 3 more bells. In the past, the Church had 6 bells but has not for many years. The upkeep of bells is very expensive! These six bells will ring the familiar peal of bells that everyone associates with traditional bell ringing. It will be quite a sound. The Church is able to pay for this work thanks to the National Heritage Lottery Fund. A small team of villagers put together an application and were awarded around £35,000. They received great support from the rest of the village. Money has also been raised through a number of community efforts and some private and generous donors. The three extra bells are being provided by The Keltek Trust, a charity devoted to the preservation of church bells.

Project leader, Ben May, explained the project in further detail. "Our purpose is not only to add something special to what is a unique church -St John the Evangelist is over 900 years and is Grade I listed - but to share this historic step with future generations We are collaborating with young people from Seahaven Academy who will be trained by the Brighton-based oral history organisation, Strike a Light, in the craft and skill of interviewing people about their lives and experiences They will go and see the work being done on the bells at Blyth & Co. Our team of young historians will be encouraged to research the gravestones at St John's, bearing names that might mean much to those living in Newhaven who have connections with the village. The stories they gather will contribute to a book and digital resource celebrating our shared heritage.

In addition to working with young people from Seahaven Academy, we hope to collaborate with a local primary school, sharing the ancient musical skill of handbell ringing with a professional musician and bell ringer.

We will be marking this historic moment with a publication, exhibition and documentary film made by Seaford-based Iris Visual Media Productions. We hope to connect all the churches in the Ouse Valley from Lewes to Newhaven with a bell-ringing festival to celebrate our rich musical and imaginative heritage."

COST OF LIVING

As the cost-of-living crisis continues with rising food and energy prices we look at what you can do to cope with soaring prices and what to do if you are in financial difficulties.

Lewes District Citizens Advice can provide help with income maximisation, budgeting and debt, food bank referrals and fuel and other vouchers. There is extra help available for pensioners.

Food bank referrals

A number of foodbanks & affordable food projects serve the Lewes District community. They can help with food if you have a short-term crisis due to a benefits delay or an unforeseen expense.

The foodbank can provide a balanced nutritional selection of tinned and dried food for up to 6 weeks depending on your circumstances.

Some foodbanks require a referral, which Lewes District Citizens Advice may be able to provide, others you can access directly.

Emergency Fuel Vouchers

You might be able to get a fuel voucher. This is a code given to you in a letter or in a text message or email. You can use it to add credit to your gas card or electricity key. To check your eligibility please contact us.

Financial Support Packages

The government and Lewes District Council have announced a number of measures to ease the cost of living crisis.

Financial support schemes include:

- Lewes District Council Cost of Living Emergency Scheme will provide support to households on a low income but those not in receipt of means tested benefits.
- Help with energy bills. From October 2022, there's a limit on gas and electricity unit prices for most households the Energy Price Guarantee, which will be in place for 6 months.
- From October you'll get £400 off your electricity bill through the Energy Bills Support Scheme. The money will be paid in six instalments and you will not be asked to provide any personal or bank account details to receive the payments. If you have a prepayment meter, your supplier will let you know how they will issue the discount.

The Club has four lathes and also has chisels and other turning tools available to use. With this wealth of equipment, the Club is currently running a wood turning day every Tuesday. Initially there will be teaching sessions and days with expert help at hand to guide and advise. Those who are passed out on the lathes will be able to use them unsupervised. The Club has limited safety equipment for members but participants are advised to have their own if possible.

Wood Creatives are a diverse group of men & women who love creating and making things from wood. Our members are making items from the wide variety of wood available to us using a variety of techniques. These include relief carving, sculpture, lathe turning, scroll sawing and pyrography - just to name a few. We also have been known

to make furniture, boxes and other household items as well as fixing chairs, stools and other broken and damaged furniture - we have been "The Repair Shop" for decades, we are always open to new ideas and techniques that broaden the scope for working with the wide variety of timbers available and to include the many craft skills involved in working creativity with wood.






Newhaven Art Club well established, fun and creative club run by its members for the members with local meetings and exhibitions.

What is VRAC?

A cross-border project delivered in the UK, (East Sussex and Norfolk) Belgium, France, and the Netherlands. The VRAC project existed to support young people and their families to improve their wellbeing and overcome barriers in engaging in education. VRAC East Sussex was a free-to-use service for selected participants in the Havens and Hailsham areas.

VRAC's Final Phase

The VRAC project was a timed project now nearing completion. The Wellbeing Service, PACE activity sessions and the School-Transition Workshops have all completed their work, and the final counselling sessions are underway.

The VRAC Final Conference is being held in Mechelen in Belgium, which will include a range







of workshops designed to highlight VRAC project learnings.

VRAC Findings

It has been clear that the VRAC project services met real need. The project's impacts and feedback have been very positive. VRAC data has been compiled into a cross-border VRAC Project Final Publication to include key learnings and recommendations.
