
As Newhaven Matters goes to press we are waiting for the decision of the Supreme Court as to whether the beach can be registered as a village green. We thought this was a good time to look back at the beach's history.

The beach came into existence soon after the building of the western harbour breakwater began in 1879. Before that time the sea came right up to the cliffs at the foot of Castle Hill and the whole foreshore area was freely accessible to local residents. The building of the breakwater changed the marine currents and allowed the build-up of silt and sand within the arm.

Historically, there have been only two periods when public access to the beach was prohibited – during both World Wars the beach was closed for national security reasons. Whilst local residents tolerated this for the duration of hostilities for the good of the country, as soon as peace was restored they lobbied the

authorities to restore their rights to go on to the beach. During the First World War the walk way to the beach was fenced off with locked gates at Sleepers Hole (by what is now Newhaven Marina). When the gates were not re-opened immediately after the War, local feeling was so strong that members of the local Council acted on behalf of the community and marched to the gates and cut them open. Clearly, then as now, local residents felt very strongly that this was their beach and that their rights were being violated.

Apart from during the wars, generations of local families have enjoyed using the beach. When the town council decided to apply for village green status to try and get the beach reopened following its closure in 2008 we were sent hundreds of photos as evidence for our application and these are some of them.




GRANTS GIVEN TO LOCAL ORGANISATIONS

The town council's Grant Aid Sub Committee met in November to decide grant applications. A total of more than £5,000 was given to local organisations for a wide range of purposes. The Air Cadets were given £300 for adventure training equipment and new uniforms; Guides and Brownies groups were given funding to enable members from low income families to attend Olave, an international camp which is being hosted by Sussex in 2015; The Meridian Mature

Citizens Forum received £200 towards their Sunday lunch club and their Christmas lunch; Newhaven Cricket Club was given £200 for a new portable lightweight bowling machine; and Newhaven Tennis Club received funding for the purchase of new balls and rackets for use by juniors.

It has been decided to hold a second round of grant awards in February, so if your organisation missed the first round and would like to apply for funding,

Home Fires: A haunting story of love and loss during the Great War

Zap Art/inroads co-production, Newhaven Fort 18th – 21st March 2015

2014 marks the Centenary of the First World War, a landmark anniversary for Britain and the world. Home Fires is a brand new play by Sara Clifford exploring the role Newhaven, Seaford and their surrounding villages played during the First World War.

Newhaven, September 1914. When Clara's husband Joe is called away to serve, they both believe he will be back in time for Christmas. But things are no longer as they were, and society is changing – there's a strike in the soldiers' training camp in Seaford, and in France, inexplicably, the British army seems to be losing. By November, as the generals frantically call up volunteers to send to the front, Clara

clings to the old ways, even as everything is crumbling around her.

Based on local people's family stories of the Great War, this new site responsive promenade play draws on text, sound and visual projections, to create a haunting story of love and loss.

TOWN COUNCIL TO CARRY OUT EXCITING WORLD WAR ONE PROJECT

Newhaven Town Council has received £23,900 from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF)



for an exciting new project, "Newhaven's First World War". Over the next eighteen months this project will result in seven information boards the "Poppy Trail" - around the town giving information about the town's role during the war. There will be website pages giving much more detailed information and workshops and talks for local schools, local community groups and the general public, including family history workshops. Interesting and informative guided walks

will take place and there will be an exhibition of work produced by local children.

Newhaven was one of the major supply ports during the First World War, helping to keep the troops on the Western Front equipped with everything from food, to horses and munitions and much more besides. The harbour was busy 24 hours a day with transport ships arriving, being loaded up and leaving again. Four thousand soldiers were garrisoned in the town to defend it; the Hillcrest Centre was a hospital and from 1917 there was a seaplane base on the eastern side of the harbour to help protect the shipping from submarine attack.

Newhaven's First World War


Following on from the last two issues of Newhaven Matters, we continue to look at what was happening in Newhaven at the outbreak of the First World War. These stories were taken from the East Sussex News on 8th January and 19th February 1915.

On 1st January 1915, a New Year's Day dinner was given for members of the Imperial Service Unit, based at Newhaven. The event was held at the Drill Hall. in Bridge Street and began with a dinner at mid-day. In the evening, about 100 of the wives and children of the men were entertained to tea and games, and each child received a present. This was followed by music and dancing. "The happy gathering" concluded about midnight with the singing of 'Auld Lang Syne' and 'God Save the King'.

On 18th February 2015, the Lord Lieutenant of the county, the Duke of Norfolk, inspected the 4th Battalion of the Royal Sussex Regiment. The battalion consisted of 900 officers, NCOs and men, who were in full war kit. The inspection took place between Fort Road and the harbour, and the Duke of Norfolk conveyed "his pleasure at being privileged to come and inspect such a fine body of men". Afterwards, the Duke inspected the men's quarters and cookhouses and "expressed his satisfaction at all that he had seen".



Newhaven Fort and Garrison

The book is not about Newhaven men who served in the war but the units and men who were stationed in the town and Fort during the war, (although some of course were Newhaven men) and where they were accommodated and their duties. Although the town was never subjected to hostile attacks or an invasion it provides answers to what kind of attacks were planned for, how the attacks were to be repelled and by whom.

WORLD WAR ONE REMEMBRANCE MEDALS FOR LOCAL CHILDREN



The Town Mayor, Councillor Judith Ost visited Newhaven's schools and nurseries before Christmas to present World War One Remembrance medals to local children. The Town Council felt that these would make a lasting memento of the current 100th anniversary commemorations for the town's children and would also fit in well with the children's learning about this terrible conflict.

The medals are made of nickel silver and presented in a Perspex case and were made by the Tower Mint.

They show silhouettes of First World War soldiers on one side and poppies on the other together with the lines "In Flanders fields the poppies blow between the crosses row on row."

A big hello from the Deans Senior Tea Club!



A new social club for seniors meets at Meeching Hall, Fort Road every Friday from 11am -1pm.

Some of the original members from the Friday Club attend the new Tea Club and they are hoping to reach a wider community. The aim is to support seniors whilst combating loneliness in older age. It is run by a small group

of volunteers and is currently applying for Charity status.

The first Tea Club began in Saltdean to create a safe warm place for seniors to meet, socialise, have fun and chat. Due to the success of that club another one followed in Telscombe which took off immediately and there are now around 75-100 members who attend the clubs each week. Tea, coffee, cake & biscuits, board games and cards, trips and entertainment are provided. The club also runs very successful Tea Dances, often attracting over 80 people.

There is no membership fee although donations to cover hall hire, leaflet costs etc are happily accepted. They have a few sponsors but still need help marketing the Newhaven club so if there are any local businesses that wish to support a local seniors' club, please get in touch and spread the word.

Newhaven Day Centre

in the Newhaven Age Concern Club, West Quay

The centre is open every Wednesday from 10am - 3pm for older people who need extra help to enjoy their day. The aim is to reduce social isolation of people in later life, assist them to remain independent, and to stay as physically and mentally active as possible.

The majority of members have some form of physical or mental health disability. Most have a mobility issue and about 60% live with some form of dementia and are dependent for help on their families or carers. For most, the centre is essential for enabling them to meet with friends and have fun. Depression is prevalent amongst the older population, particularly when they live alone and have very few opportunities to socialise. Some members do not leave their

homes other than to attend the centre. Where members live with their families, the centre offers essential respite care as well.

Newhaven Day Centre provides a range of stimulating and fun activities and entertainment, often with a reminiscence angle. People with memory problems are delighted when they do recall events and this can lead to a definite improvement in their mood and self esteem. External providers also work with the staff to broaden the activities on offer. Regular chair based exercises. delivered by a trainer, are a favourite activity and members say they really do help to keep them more flexible and mobile. A balanced nutritious meal, cooked freshly on the premises, is an important

feature of the day. They also celebrate birthdays and special holidays such as Christmas and Easter, and a number of outings are also arranged each year. Information and advice are offered on health matters, personal safety, maximising income, keeping warm in winter etc and signpost to other organizations as appropriate.





Newhaven Volunteers Assist the Ambulance Service

The South East Coast Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust is proud to train volunteers so that in their spare time they can be available for selected 999 calls to help other members of the community.

The Newhaven Responder Lead Nigel Ring said "Being an integral part of the ambulance service team is one that I feel proud and honoured to do. So far this year I have attended over 200 999 calls to help those in pain or distress."

Will Morris, also a Newhaven Responder responsible for equipment and logistics, manages to work full time as a member of the Ambulance Service and still finds time to respond on a regular basis and is a great asset to the team.

The service is looking for more volunteers with some time to spare to respond in their community. If you are interested contact sussex.cfr@secamb.nhs.uk.

Volunteers can be male or female, aged over eighteen years. They must have access to a car and be able to attend emergency calls from either their home or place of work as soon as they are received.

A Community First Responder needs to be extremely reliable and trust worthy, good under pressure, able to remain calm in emergency situations, be caring when dealing with patients and have a reasonable level of physical fitness. Prospective responders have to undergo a Criminal Records Bureau Check (CRB) which is carried out by the Ambulance Trust following a successful interview.





If you do not feel able to train as a CFR but would still like to help your community and make a difference, volunteers to help fundraise are always welcome.



WINTRY WEATHER MEANS SLIPPERY ROADS AND PAVEMENTS

Every winter when the temperature drops to sub-zero or the snow falls, our roads and pavements become very slippery.

East Sussex County Council, as the Highway Authority, is responsible for gritting (salting) the roads - but they can't treat all roads. They have to prioritise the busiest roads in order to avoid the most serious accidents. You can see a map of roads that will be treated online at www.eastsussex. gov.uk/roadsandtransport/ roads/maintenance/ saltingandgritting. The gritting lorries follow specified routes and cannot spread grit on other roads near to the roads that have been prioritised as they would not have enough grit to complete their route. If you don't live on a road that has been identified by ESCC as a primary or secondary route your road will not be gritted. ESCC does not grit pavements.

You can, however, help yourselves and help your neighbours by clearing snow and ice from pavements and public spaces outside your property. It is very unlikely that you would face any legal liability, as long as you are careful to make sure that you do not make the area more dangerous than before. Use a shovel to remove snow. Spread salt on the area you have cleared. Do NOT use hot water, as this may create black ice when the water re-freezes.

There are a number of grit (salt) bins around the town. Some of these belong to ESCC, some to LDC and some to the town council. If you see an empty bin, please report it to the town council – we are quite happy to work out who owns



it and get it refilled. If you feel an extra grit bin is needed in your area, please also let us know – we are always willing to consider such requests.





NEW TREES AT THE ROSE WALK

The town council has agreed to plant four new trees in the traffic island at The Rose Walk – to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the First World War. Town Mayor, Councillor Judith Ost will plant two whitebeam and two ornamental cherry trees which will form a beautiful, living reminder of the lives lost 100 years ago. An anodised aluminium plaque will record the planting.

Local resident Paul Farley approached the town council to ask whether it would be possible for trees to be planted at this location. Two trees had been planted there in 1953 to celebrate the Queen's coronation, but had been removed in recent years after they became damaged. Paul felt that it was important that the trees should be replaced and that they would form a lasting legacy for the town.

There have been a lot of trees planted in Newhaven recently by East Sussex County
Council as mitigation for the incinerator – but are there any other locations which might benefit from a tree or two?
The town council has limited funds, but is always willing to consider suggestions from local residents – so if, like Paul, you have a good idea, please do let us know.

the legendary Thomas Tipper.

Thomas lived in Newhaven in the 1700s. He owned a cottage and garden, next door to a warehouse which he turned into a brewery. It was demolished in 1976 to be replaced by the flats opposite the bridge to Denton Island. The cottage was also demolished and the Ship Inn

was built on its site. Thomas was a man of many talents, some of them mentioned on his headstone.

The listed Tipper monument is in St Michael's churchyard and is a fine example of a carved headstone depicting the old bridge to Denton Island. Coincidently the trust

heard that a relative of Thomas wanted to visit the grave and two NCT committee members were able to meet with him and his helper. Mr Tipper is anxious for the monument to be restored as several lines of the poem have worn away and the gravestones are leaning slightly.

Newhaven Flood Alleviation Scheme

Working together to reduce flood risk in Newhaven

Newhaven is vulnerable to flooding from the sea and the River Ouse. In December 2013 the south coast of England was hit by a storm surge which saw the highest tide in some places for almost 60 years. The tidal surge affected between 50 and 100 properties in Newhaven as well as closing the railway line between Lewes and Seaford.

The Environment Agency and Lewes District Council are working together to deliver a scheme to reduce flood risk to 437 homes and 392 businesses in Newhaven.

The scheme is estimated to cost £9 million, with the

majority of funding coming from the Environment
Agency in the form of central government grant in aid.
The Coast to Capital Local
Enterprise Partnership and
South East Local Enterprise
Partnership are each
contributing £1.5 million, as part of their wider commitment to regeneration in Newhaven.
These contributions are essential to enable the project to proceed.

We will be holding a public exhibition early in 2015 to gather feedback on our draft design options. Once we have taken these views into consideration we will share our preferred design with the community and seek the necessary formal approvals.

We plan to start building the scheme in 2016 and complete it in 2019.
