

the fallen for Armistice, the anniversaries of HMS Brazen, and also the Sussex seafarers.

• I have loved attending all the dinners and fundraisers for the Sussex Mayors Association and, of course I have loved attending and representing Newhaven at the events led by my fellow Mayors of Seaford, Peacehaven and Telscombe.

In 2025, there's also a lot of things happening in Newhaven, including observing the 80th anniversary of VE Day on 8th May at 9pm at the Newhaven Fort, with a Tribute and Beacon Lighting, and celebrating Sussex Day, a free fun community event, at the Sidings on 21st June - I hope to see you at these and other events during the year!

In other news, we have been planting 500 new trees in the cemetery. We are planting 3 species of sycamore, hawthorn and field maple all UK grown to replace the sadly declining population of Ash which has taken a hit in recent years with ash die back which is a serious fungal disease of the European ash, characterised by the progressive death of the tree's branches which sadly often gives the council no option but to fell the tree to stop the spread to nearby ash. It is so important to ensure that we replace these lost trees with indigenous species so that the eco system is supported for our local wildlife. Often during my time as Chairman of planning, when we get a request to fell trees, we will always ask that these are replaced with native

trees to keep the important and fragile balance in nature.

As I mentioned earlier, this year has been amazing. But the past few years have also been not so great for me on a personal level. And so I feel it is so important for me to show others, as someone who volunteers in the mental health sector, and promote the message that it's important to be open and honest and speak out when things are not okay. For me, 2025 is the year I prioritise health and not spreading myself so thinly by making sure I share the load sometimes. Self-care is not selfish. I work with the Nebula Mental Health Group, a free support group for anyone who wants to come along and chat and share the load.

I very much try to keep in the know, by talking to the people of Newhaven when I am out and about. I'm very involved with running my mental health group, being a trustee for CTLA or doing things with the 3rd Newhaven Scouts, and the local Bonfire Society. I have many things I am involved with locally in addition to the charity and committee work.

VE DAY 80 – 8TH MAY 2025

A Shared Moment of Celebration

Thursday 8th May 2025 observes the 80th anniversary of VE Day, which in 1945 marked the end of WWII in Europe when Germany finally surrendered to the Allies.

'VE Day' stands for 'Victory in Europe Day' – marking the end of World War Two in Europe, after six long years of fighting.

VE Day is very much a celebration. Newhaven historian, Andy Gilbert, from looking at the historic information captured on 'Our Newhaven' said: "Like most towns and cities in the UK, Newhaven celebrated VE Day in 1945 with street parties. Despite the obvious shortages of materials, enough material was found to string bunting around houses, and to create fancy dress

costumes for adults and children. Food was also in short supply but somehow parents managed to find enough to give their children something of a treat. From the photos on Our Newhaven, it looks like, now that Europe was at peace, it was time to start to smile again – as Churchill put it, '...a brief period of rejoicing...'".

The photos below, from Our Newhaven, show VE Day celebration street parties in 1945 in Rose Walk, left, and Norton Terrace, on the right.





This year, on 8th May, there are plans for beacons and 'Lights of peace' to be lit around the country, and for other commemorative celebrations. As part of the celebrations, Pageantmaster Bruno Peek is also encouraging eating fish and chips on this occasion, in acknowledgement to the fishermen who braved

German U-boats and mines and the farm workers and land girls who toiled in the fields to provide the ingredients for the staple meal of fish and chips which was one of the few foods not rationed by Prime Minister Churchill during WWII.

Joy Ashton, a dedicated Peacehaven resident and SCDA volunteer, has made an extraordinary impact on her community by raising over £4,000 for SCDA's Community Food projects. Over the past three years, Joy's enthusiasm, creativity, and commitment

have brought much-needed funds to support provision of affordable food for local residents.


Joy's journey began with a phone call to SCDA about donating egg boxes. This initial gesture led her to become a committed volunteer at Peacehaven Community Supermarket, where she has been an invaluable team member for over three years. Known for her warm and friendly welcome, Joy not only

assists with daily operations but goes above and beyond in fundraising, drawing on her resourcefulness and the support of her line dancing group.

Joy said, "It is really good to look back and remind our dancers what they have achieved and I also have great memories of the ingenious ways we thought to raise money. I am so grateful to all our dancers who support our fundraising efforts."







Newhaven Port has long been a vital gateway between the UK and Europe, steeped in rich maritime history and buzzing with modern potential. As a hub for trade, travel, and innovation, Newhaven's strategic location offers significant access to both domestic and international markets. But this is more than just a Port – it's a thriving community, a lifeline for commerce, and a bridge to exciting opportunities that continue to shape the future of Newhaven.

The Port covers a significant area, occupying most of Newhaven's eastern waterfront.

The Port is one of the major employers in the town, accounting for more than 500 direct and indirect jobs*. There has been much investment in the Port since 2012, and new organisations have made Newhaven their base of operations, e.g., Brett, FM Conway, Brightwells, Maple Handling and Rampion have all established operations at the Port. The Newhaven – Dieppe Ferry, which started a regular service in 1825, is on a stable footing; since 2012, the number of vehicles carried on the Newhaven – Dieppe ferry has increased by approximately 60%*.



The control of marine traffic entering and leaving the Port is managed by **Newhaven Port and Properties (NPP)**. This includes ferries, large cargo ships, fishing and private vessels.

Port Manager Captain Dave Collins-Williams and Harbour Master Steve Tindale along with their team manage the Port's operations. The breadth of these operations is vast, including:

- The Port Control office is manned 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, to manage vessels entering and leaving the Port.
- The ferry terminal is located in and owned by the Port but leased to LCT Support Services.
 The ferry route is contracted out to a ferry operator, DFDS Seaways. This arrangement has been successful and since the early 2000s, ferry carryings have approximately doubled*.
- The Port acts as a hub for construction materials and shipment of recyclables. For example, olive trees are a regular type of cargo and these are screened for mites and bugs. Steve Tindale, Harbour Master, said: 'Overall, the maritime sector supports over £47 billion in business turnover, and 220,100 jobs across the UK.*** Approximately 95% of all UK imports and exports by volume are moved by sea. * * * This is about 475 million tonnes. Approximately 1 million tonne of cargo is imported and exported here in Newhaven.' For example, the vessel, the MV Britannia Beaver, regularly brings in dredged materials from the sea bed (aggregates), which can then be used in the building trade. Last year, there were 117 visits by aggregate ships, which brought 588,000 tonnes of aggregates through the Port. 40% of the aggregates that comes in though Newhaven goes out by train reducing the number of trucks on our roads. Newhaven is one of a few Ports with a railhead, which enables goods to be transferred onto trains.
- Overseeing the transporting of the crew who work on the Rampion wind turbines to and from the turbines.

Have you ever noticed the **Swing Plate**? This huge plate of metal, approx. 32m wide and 10m long, helps the ferries when they need to turn around in the Port.

The ferries sail front first, or more correctly, bow first into the Port and then dock in the Ferry Terminal area of the Port. If the weather is kind, they can back out of the Port when they leave. However, should the wind be 25 knots or more, the ferries are required to turn around in the Port and sail out bow first.

With the turning circle by the Ferry Terminal being 149m and the ferries being 143m in length, this doesn't leave much room for

Looking ahead, it is anticipated that the ferry business should continue to grow.

Newhaven has had an active Port since 1847, and Newhaven Port is doing its bit to ensure it continues to thrive for many generations to come. One of Newhaven Port's key aims for the next 20 years, as set out in the Port's Masterplan, is to reduce their carbon footprint and the environmental impact of their operations. The Port already contributes to sustainable economic growth for East Sussex and neighbouring areas by providing a lowcarbon gateway for people and materials to

manoeuvring around in. So the ferries use the Swing Plate to line up towards and push against whilst turning. This helps them with the turning process whilst of course also protecting the edges of the Port. The ferries are manually driven by their captains. Unlike car drivers, the ferry captains do not have computers or parking sensors to help them.

Last year, the Port replaced the old swing plate with a new one. The photo below shows the damaged state of the old swing plate, which had numerous repairs over the years, and provides a great indication of how it helps to protect the sides of the Port.

move in and out of the region. Transport by sea is the lowest emission option for cargo - on average, it produces 20 - 30 times less greenhouse gas emissions than air freight. In addition, a large proportion of aggregate material brought into the Port by ship is exported via freight train, thereby reducing emissions and the amount of traffic on our roads. One freight train removes around 40 trucks from our roads. The Port has installed substantial amounts of solar panels to meet their own energy needs within the Port estate and they are looking to expand this capacity in the future.

Swing Bridge

We have all probably sat in the traffic at some point while the Swing Bridge opens. In our next issue, we will include a focus on the Swing Bridge - why it opens, when it opens, what's

Our aim is not simply to work with wood but to recycle, upcycle, repair and reuse wood in every possible way: discarded offcuts, cut logs, even driftwood are being transformed into unique, beautiful pieces, from boxes to bowls, pens to portraits, stools to signage. For beginners, the club offers the use of a good selection of carving chisels as well as the machinery, hand and power tools needed to bring a project to life. We are discovering that even those with their own equipped workshops at home find that coming along to the club is good for company and comradeship.

Wood Creatives have a dedicated space at the Hillcrest Centre, Newhaven. Parking is free and the Centre's café is open daily. Currently, our workshop is open weekdays, 9.30am to 3.30pm, plus Thursday evenings, 6pm to 9pm. Since our numbers have increased, we are now considering sessions on weekends and on other evenings too. We strive to provide a friendly and helpful environment with informal advice and practical support from our more seasoned members. At present, fees are £25 per month (tea, coffee and biscuits included), with concessions where applicable.

We are always keen to invite new members to join us, so if you're interested in working with wood, do pop by – any weekday or on a Thursday evening – to see what we do and we'll give you a guided tour.

NCI Newhaven: a recruit's story

Eight and a half years ago, during a lengthy re-fit of my boat, I felt I was losing my connection with the sea.

I had heard of the National Coastwatch Institution (NCI) so I looked into what they did and where they were. I was excited to find they have a coastal lookout on the clifftop above Newhaven Fort. I thought this is something I could do, so I made contact and arranged a visit, during which I learned of the very important work they do and decided to sign up.

There is a training programme which I passed quite quickly and became a certified watchkeeper with NCI.

Personally, for someone who loves looking out over the sea and wishes to volunteer for a worthy cause, I cannot think of a better way to fulfil my desire to do something worthwhile and possibly save a life too.

The training enables us to spot, plot and report directly to His Majesty's Coastguard in the event of any concerning event along our part of the coast and out to sea.

The actions of the NCI nationally, including at NCI Newhaven, have contributed to saving many lives every year of the charity's 30-year existence. NCI now operates 60 stations along the coast of England and Wales.

A good day for us is when we haven't had to contact the coastguard, as that means that nobody has needed assistance from our search and rescue partners. Our constant vigilance means that should we spot something that doesn't look quite right we know, due to our training, how to respond swiftly and accurately. This ensures that the correct search and rescue assets are deployed by HMCG in the shortest possible time.

Recreational watersports enthusiasts and beachgoers may not realise but using our very powerful optics and safety cameras we are keeping a constant watch over the whole area within our view during daylight hours. The events we witness and help with are varied: a kite surfer who gets into trouble out at sea, a small inflatable boat having engine trouble, or a child being carried out to sea from Seaford beach by wind or tide on an inflatable toy. It could be a person overboard from a fishing vessel, or an angler getting cut off by the tide. We are watching constantly to ensure that if needed, we will respond appropriately and quickly.

When I joined the NCI, I had no idea that 5 years later, I would become the Station Manager at NCI Newhaven, following a couple of years serving on the management team as Maintenance Officer. It is a rewarding and worthwhile role.

The fantastic thing about our crew of approximately 75 watchkeepers who volunteer at NCI Newhaven, is the wide variety of skills our watchkeepers bring from all walks of life. Many come to us without any knowledge of the

marine environment, but that is no barrier to becoming a watchkeeper as full training is given.

During a quiet watch, I find it fascinating to learn of what a watchkeeper has done before joining NCI and I am always amazed at the stories they have to tell.

As a charity (No 1159975) our station is self-funding, so many of you may have seen members of our crew smiling, giving information and collecting funds outside local supermarkets. You may also see us at a local fete, where our fundraising team have set up a stall, and our coastal water safety officer is passing information on how to stay safe when visiting the coast.

If you do see our crew out fundraising, please consider dropping a coin in our bucket, or tapping your card on the card reader. 
Moving forward we are in principle supportive of outline proposals to develop an integrated management plan embracing both Tide Mills and its nearby open spaces. You

A HISTORY OF RIVERSIDE HALL **AND LOCAL MENCAP**

Riverside Hall was originally built in the very early 20th Century as a place of worship. It was used as a "Mission for Seamen" and in wartime was used by troops before they were transported across the channel to fight. The hall itself has altered over the years, adapting for use when required.

Newhaven, Lewes and District Mencap has gone through many transitions since the original Society began.

In 1965 a group of parents and friends of young people with learning disabilities and difficulties created the club for all in the local area. In the very beginning, the group of parents and their children used to meet up in their own homes every week to encourage social interaction. The bond between

the society and its members has continued over the years.

Riverside Hall has been the venue for the social club since the 1970s when the hall belonged to British Rail and was used by our group.

During the 1980s, the hall became the permanent location for our charity and club, run by a group of totally dedicated people.

From October 2009, the Society incorporated the name of Lewes in its title, and since then we have been known as Newhaven, Lewes & District Mencap, welcoming our Members from all the surrounding towns, as far as Lewes, Eastbourne and Hove.

Our charity is indebted to the "Pioneer Families" and volunteers for establishing our organisation and we continue their vision today.

We have Friday night clubs for our Members when entertainment is provided, and twice a month we have Event nights, inviting the public to join us and enjoy booked entertainment.

As a charity, we attend all local fayres and events, raising much needed funds on our Tombola stalls.

Since 2023, we have been making our hall available for private hire. With capacity for

...AND ALL FOR THE PRICE OF A PINT OR TWO!

It had all started so simply. Paul Vaughan, a wandering musician of this parish, had negotiated a space in The Ark Pub on West Quay to sing and play guitar. There was no amplification and no stage. A simple A4 flyer stuck on the window encouraged any would-be performers to join him. I, and many others, did exactly that.

A year on... same venue...
You could almost have heard a pin drop. Jane, the landlady's mother had stepped up to the microphone to treat the pub's customers to a sensitive rendition of "Somewhere over the rainbow". It was beautifully done and accompanied, and the applause was long and loud. That same evening, blues, rock and roll, satirical ballads, reggae, punk and folk also had an airing... and at one particularly raucous



point of the evening her daughter, the landlady herself, leapt onto the bar top to lead some frantic dancing. Who would have thought that there were so many varied musicians and music lovers tucked away in and around Newhaven?

From the small beginning, the event had grown. There was now a PA and a full back line available. Regulars came from as far afield as Hastings, Uckfield and Brighton. Why, we even entertained the off-duty crew of the Newhaven-Dieppe ferry and cyclists dropping in on their way from London to Paris. The venture spawned extra events at key parts of the year such as Halloween, Easter and Christmas, when as many as fourteen musicians would be "on stage" at any one time. There were other spinoffs. New bands formed and some regular attendees went off to start open mics in their own towns. If we measure success by the numbers attending, whether performing or watching, and the money passing over the bar, that first open mic venue quickly became a roaring success. We were stunned by the response. It was always rammed on Open Mic nights.

In the intervening years between then and now, much has changed. Covid came and lingered and our musical endeavours were limited to banging baking trays on the doorstep. Licensees moved on, performers and audience got older, married, moved, had children, found other interests, and the Open Mic itself has travelled, residing in turn in the now defunct Newhaven Social Club, the Jolly Boatman, the Prince of Wales and for some years now, in our current home, the last pub in England before France...The Hope Inn.

"Open Mic" takes place every second Friday of the month, starting at 8.30pm. Microphones and amplification are still on hand and there is always a house band present. usually consisting of guitar (Paul Vaughan) bass (Duncan Campbell) and drums (Tony Still) ready to support any performers who wish it. We welcome first time performers, seasoned troupers and music of all kinds. It is always very informal. Just turn up and talk to one of us to get your name on the list. The only thing we are wary of (though we'd never ban anything outright!) is the use of backing tracks. Don't be shy or nervous, you'll find us very supportive. If you are not a would-be performer and just looking for a good night out, all for the price of a pint, just turn up in time to get a seat. Better still, come earlier and eat.

You'll be assured of a warm welcome, both on and off-stage...



Newhaven Fort re-opens following £7.5m restoration



Newhaven Fort has reopened its doors to the public following a transformative £7.5m restoration of the historic landmark.

After 12 months of closure, the newly restored 19th century fort boasts an enhanced visitor experience, featuring a brandnew adventure playground, interactive exhibitions and an exciting 1970s-themed escape room, which opens in April 2025. Visitors can now explore previously inaccessible areas, including the restored Battery Observation Post, which offers stunning views of the Sussex coastline.

The Romney Hut in the fort's parade square has been reclad and insulated, providing a versatile event space for schools, weddings and corporate hire. Additionally, each of the fort's 18 casemates – vaults within the site – have been re-vamped to serve as engaging exhibition areas, with two casemates available for venue hire.

The fort is hosting a vibrant programme of events this year, including workshops, guided tours, exhibitions and talks.

Standard tickets (£12.95 for adults, £9.95 for children, free for under-4s) allow unlimited visits for 12 months during seasonal opening hours, with discounted rates available for seniors, students, disabled visitors, families and groups.

Lindsay Lawrence, general manager at Newhaven Fort, said: "We are thrilled to welcome visitors back to this historic site after such a milestone project.

"Our restoration has not only preserved the fort for future generations, but has also transformed it into a more accessible, sustainable and dynamic visitor attraction. With a brand-new escape room, a bigger and better adventure playground and a host of new exhibitions, there is truly something for everyone to enjoy."

Visitors can relax in the fort's new café, run by the Sussex-renowned Cadence Cycle Club, serving freshly brewed coffee, toasties and pastries. Visitor facilities have also been upgraded, including the gift shop and toilets, with improved accessibility and updated

signage across the fort.

To safeguard the fort's long-term future, extensive preservation works were undertaken, including structural and drainage repairs, brickwork re-pointing, and electrical and ventilation upgrades.

Duncan Kerr, chief executive at Wave Active, which operates Newhaven Fort, said: "Newhaven Fort stands as one of Sussex's most cherished landmarks. Preserving this unique site is a privilege, and we look forward to the many benefits its restoration will bring to our community for years to come."

Pilbeam Construction served as the delivery partner for the restoration, while funding was granted for the fort's restoration by Lewes District Council through capital funding programmes being delivered in Newhaven, including the Town Deal fund.


